Women's basketball to come to Trevecca for fall 1996

Trevecca Nazarene University's Department of Athletics has announced the formation of a women's basketball team to begin play in the fall of 1996. TNU Athletic Director Dr. Lora Donoho has overseen the establishment of the team. According to Dr. Donoho, the search is well under way for a head coach. An announcement is expected soon. Donoho also notes that several TNU students have already expressed interest in playing and good prospects are ready to sign to play.

Q: What general comments do you have concerning women's basketball at TNU and the role of Title IX?

A: I think the addition of women's basketball will

strengthen the men's programs. But

irrespective of that, whether it does or it doesn't, we have to come into compliance on the gender equality issue. That challenge has been set before us by the federal government, we have to do that. Secondly it makes sense that we add women's basketball because there's not a high school in Tennessee that doesn't have a women's basketball team. To make a long story short, they accepted that report and it was voted upon. The intercollegiate athletic board accepted it, the administrative team accepted it, and the Board of Trustees accepted it.

Q: What was the date that the board accepted it?

A: I think that it was

middle March. We have been interviewing coaches since about March 21. We did an actual search and I sent notifications out to approximately 90 of the Christian College Coalition schools. I think March 31 was the final date for applications. We also have three or four top quality Nashville girls that we have been talking to. So I feel really good about recruitment, plus we have a lot of very fine athletes on campus. I think we would really have enough athletes on campus to have a team.

Q: How do you think it coordinates or fits with the others—in particular men's basketball?

A: It will be fine. In fact the women's basketball games will precede the men's. We'll have double

headers, not only at home but on the road. It will bring an excitement to us that we have never had before. I had great cooperation from Coach Harris and the men's program. From our communication and our conversations, I think that he feels very positive about it. I think he's quite excited about it.

Q: When were the first thoughts of having women's basketball here?

A: My first thoughts were immediately after Dr. Reed hired me as Athletic Director. I couldn't believe that we didn't have it. From the time he hired me, I thought that would solve a lot of problems. Women's basketball seems like a natural to me. My simplicity says that you look for what you have

going for you first, and basketball is the natural thing going for us here. We have the facility, (we don't have to build a new gym for it); everything is set except for the coach and the girls, and those are easy to get. You have to have the will to do it and the mind to do it.

Q: Future Plans - Is this the first step of what you would like to add to Trevecca sports?

A: As a part of that same plan, we have projected that in 1998 we should look in the addition of either men's or women's tennis and then about in the year 2000 the addition of men's and women's soccer. I think that golf is a possibility down in the future. That's an ongoing evaluation process.

Enrollment continues to climb

There were a few good things that came out of World War II. This is an opinion held by many of the people in Enrollment Services as they prepare for another promising year in the area of enrollment.

During the decade after World War II, there was a frenzy of births commonly known as the Baby Boom. The population rose almost 20 percent during that time. Trevecca is benefiting from that increase in population today because a large portion of the children of these baby boomers are now ready to enter college.

Rick Underwood, Director of Recruitment, commented, "A fact that is really encouraging is that in the next five years there is going to be an upswing in the number of students that are available to come to college."

Enrollment Services is busily preparing for another good year of enrollment. The 50% increase in freshman enrollment that occurred in the fall of 1995 is not expected to be repeated; nonetheless, the increase is expected to remain steady. "We are working hard to have a steady enrollment, because a steady predictable enrollment is necessary in order to plan for the

future of the University," Underwood said.

This fall the final count of freshman was 228; the predicated amount for next fall is 250. The number of transfers is expected to be about the same as this year and the retention rate looks promising. In fact, the administration is predicting around a 70% retention rate. This year's preregistration at the end of April is 119 students ahead of last April's count.

The graduate and adult programs will probably not fluctuate much in enrollment, not because of a lack of interest by students, but

Summer brings renovations, improvements to campus

The approach of summer means many things for the students and faculty of TNU. Some get ready for summer jobs or mission work, others stay on campus during the summer to take some extra classes. Many will rest and relax during the break. But not the maintenance staff.

The approach of graduation means the approach of a campus-wide improvement program for TNU. Maintenance workers and hired contractors will be busy repairing, redecorating, and improving the campus during the summer months. Indeed, we can expect quite a few surprises when we return

in the fall.

Student housing will be a major area of activity this summer. Steve Wilson, director of maintenance, and his staff will be busy working on the dorms, in some cases with the help of outside companies.

Many of the dorms and other buildings will be painted.

Benson Dormitory will receive fresh coats of paint in all of the rooms on the fourth, second, first, and basement floors. The second floors of Johnson and Georgia and the third floor of Tennessee will also be painted as well as the outside of the Jernigan center and possibly the P.E. center. Other improvements to the dorms include more new

furniture in Benson Hall and the installation of exhaust fans and new ceilings in the girl's bathrooms. A professional cleaning company will be hired to clean the floors and walls of all four dorms.

Starting July 1 the laundry facilities will receive attention. All of the laundry rooms will be restored and remodeled, and new equipment will be installed. Georgia Hall will acquire another laundry room located on the ground level next to the University Clinic.

Besides the dormitories, many other areas will receive attention. Some of the projects that Wilson and his staff will try to complete are:

1. The Greathouse Science Building's restrooms will be redecorated,

2. Remodeling and redecorating of the pool area,

3. Floodlights will be added to Mackey Library, McClurkan Hall, and Adams Administration to illuminate them at night,

4. An additional parking lot will be added to the present one behind Tidwell Hall,

5. Additional landscaping across the campus.

Work on the new entranceway to Trevecca is also planned to begin this summer. However, as Dean of Students Steve Harris explains, construction for the project could be delayed. In order to build the entranceway, the plans

must go through various construction committees and be voted on by the Nashville City Council. The illness of Trevecca President Millard Reed has also delayed the project, Harris said.

Dean Harris also said that Trevecca was looking into building a perimeter driveway around the campus, and that the present parking area behind the Adams Administration Building will be removed and closed off except for a short driveway to Johnson Hall. This will help privatize the campus and provide parking all around TNU. However, Dean Harris says that the school isn't certain if and when this will be done.

Planning begins for new library

"The Strategic Plan..." It sounds good, but is it happening? and when? We'll see in the next few years as plans for a new library will hopefully be actualized.

A new library for Trevecca is the first building to be constructed in the university's strategic plan. It is scheduled to be finished by 2000-2001 and ready to be dedicated at the school's 100th birthday.

Professional library consultant Jay Lucker came to Trevecca in January to recommend changes.

His recommendation was that a new library building be built to contain a floor area of 50,000 square feet, more the double the current 24,800 of Mackey library.

Following Lucker's consultation and needs assessment, the next step is the development of a building program. For this, the new library committee is gathering ideas for what to include in the new library, creating a mission statement and philosophy

for library development, and learning how to do a building plan. The building program report is being prepared for the Board of Trustees meeting in October. At this time the Trustees will decide when to act upon the plans.

What are some of the ideas for the new library? More group study rooms, an aesthetically pleasing setting, the addition of a high tech wing, and a library instruction room are just a few ideas. Suggestions from the student body were gathered during lunch on Tuesday, April 16.

After receiving approval from the Board of Trustees, remaining steps for the project will be to hire an architect, finalize construction drawings, construct the library, and finally occupy and dedicate the building. The cost will be approximately \$150 per square foot, making the price of the building about \$7 million dollars.

The new library is to be situated just north of the Fine Arts/Library parking lot and will be the first university building seen from Trevecca's new entrance.

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because of the limited number of students that Trevecca admits into these special programs. The traditional enrollment may exceed 900 and the total enrollment for next fall is expected to be around 1550-1600 students.

The increased enrollment may present some obstacles that can be avoided by planning. One of the most central to the students at Trevecca is the problem with long lines at registration. The administration suggests that all students that have preregistered should make every effort to complete their registration by mail when the materials are sent in late July or early August.

Wellness Center to offer expanded fitness opportunities

Do you regard your body as a temple of God? Are you currently practicing good stewardship of your body by learning to incorporate diet, exercise, and rest and relaxation into your lifestyle and lifetime activities? There is no time better to develop a healthy lifestyle than now. A new Wellness Center, proposed to be completed by the beginning of the fall semester, will help all of us practice a healthier lifestyle.

A great deal of time has been spent this year discussing plans and ideas for the Wellness Center. The committee working on the development of the concept and design of the Wellness Center has visited a variety of exercise facilities throughout the year to gain insights and ideas. Places visited include Vanderbilt, Belmont, David Lipscomb, and many health clubs in the area including the YMCA and For Women Only.


The new Wellness Center will be located on the ground floor level of the physical education center in the area where Audio/Visual, general offices, and the current

weight room are now located. A great deal of remodeling will be done in this area throughout the summer to make the Wellness Center a reality. All interior walls will be removed to produce one large, open space with free weights, weight machines, and cardio-vascular exercise equipment.

Attempts will be made to make the area as bright as possible. Additional windows will be installed to let the maximum amount of sunlight enter the room. Also, a section of the interior wall may be glass as well. Mirrors will be installed on the other interior walls.

The walls and ceiling will be painted a light color to help make the area brighter. Ceiling fans will also be installed to help improve the air circulation in the facility. A ramp on the exterior of the building will provide easier access.

Plans are under way to install a stereo system throughout the facility. TVs will be installed in the cardio-vascular fitness area. The TVs will be wired so that the sound can be received through an FM frequency listed on the TV. The channels will be pre-set so a student will be able to receive CNN, ESPN, or any other

channels by tuning into the appropriate FM frequency on their personal Walkman. The following equipment will be available in the cardio-vascular fitness area: a rower, recumbent bikes, treadmills, stair climbers, transports, and traditional exercise bikes. Females tend to prefer the recumbent bike over the traditional bike, so these have been included. The single station weight equipment that is being purchased is manufactured by

Paramount Fitness Equipment. Several pieces of equipment from their performance line have already been purchased. Additional equipment will be purchased as remodeling proceeds. The weight area will comprise a large portion of where the current weight room is located. There are also plans to have a computer terminal available so that students will be able to track their exercise programs and progress.

"It is our hope that 100% of Trevecca's

faculty, staff, and students will take advantage of the Wellness Center. We know that many students are not able to participate in intramural programs because of work or other conflicts. The Wellness Center may meet the needs of faculty, staff, and students by encouraging them to become involved in regular fitness activities that they can individualize to meet their current needs," said Dean of Students Steve Harris.

Information Technology Services plans summer projects

With the addition of the new computer labs last year, Trevecca students have found themselves cruising along on the information superhighway. Soon, they will be ready to get in the fast lane.

Brian Sims, director of information technology services (ITS), has budgeted to install more computers and an entire new phone system on campus.

Starting in the fall of 1996, every dorm room in Benson, Johnson, Georgia,

and Tennessee dormitories will come with its own phone and voice mail. Students will no longer be required to provide their own phones and answering machines. The new phones will be equipped with an electronic "mail box" onto which callers can leave messages. Students will be able to create their own messages for the mailbox. A flashing light on the phone will indicate when a message has been received.

Along with the new phones, new phone lines will be installed. Students

have sometimes encountered problems calling off campus or vice-versa. Another problem was that other conversations could sometimes be heard on the phone. The existing phone lines will be taken out and fiber optic cables will be installed to clear up the problems.

Students have benefited greatly by the availability of the computers and the Internet in the computer labs. Now they will have greater access to the World-Wide Web. Next semester new Pentium

computer mini-labs will be installed in the men's and women's dorms. Benson Hall will receive four computers and a laser printer and each of the women's dorms will receive two computers and a laser printer. Along with the new computer labs, the existing Macintosh lab will become a multimedia lab, complete with CD-Rom and Internet access. Also, all of the student-accessible computers on campus will have Netscape Internet capability. A T1 connection will open up more channels and make it possible to access the

Internet from around campus. However, Sims says it will depend on the students if Netscape remains available to the campus. If Netscape begins to be abused, it will be removed.

Due to the expansion of technology on campus, Sims has hired more staff to help operate the ITS department. The existing staff will go from two to five members. One of the new positions will be a full-time computer lab coordinator to help operate and control the computer labs on campus.

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Eye on Your Aid: final advice

This is our final "Eye on Your Aid" column for the 95-96 school year. My how time flies! It seems like just yesterday we were beginning the fall semester. We in the Financial Aid Office have enjoyed serving you this year. Your Financial Aid Office is not always able to do everything you want us to do (i.e. free ride!), but we make a sincere effort to help you find ways to pay your school bill.

Our office also wants to wish our graduating seniors the very best and remind them to come see us to do the necessary Stafford Loan exit interview. Speaking of loans, remember these important points:

1. For Stafford loans you begin repayment 6 months after you are no longer a student; for the Perkins loan you begin repayment 9 months after you are no longer a student.
2. If you are going to

graduate school you can keep a deferment on your loans by notifying your lenders of your future plans.

3. DON'T DEFAULT ON YOUR STUDENT LOANS!

Now on to 1996-97! We will be awarding financial aid for all returning students beginning in the last part of May. We wait until May so that we can check each award for an academic scholarship based on your GPA and to make sure you are making satisfactory progress. If you have been enrolled this year full time and have a cumulative GPA of a 3.3, you are eligible for an academic scholarship next year.

Let me talk a moment about satisfactory progress. Did you know that the Financial Aid Office tracks your academic progress? You must complete a minimum number of hours each year to continue receiving financial aid. For freshman and

sophomores, you generally must pass at least 16 hours per year. Juniors (and seniors who are going full time) must pass at least 24 hours per year. We also check your cumulative GPA after your fourth semester. You must have a 1.80 to continue receiving financial aid. If for one semester you receive all F's, U's, W's, or I's, or any combination of these, you will be removed from financial aid. You may also be put on financial probation if you are not passing enough hours. Financial probation is a warning that you must pass more hours in order to continue receiving aid. Feel free to call me for more information about satisfactory progress.

Drama Review: Moliere's slapstick and satire at TNU

The Moliere Comedies, student directed by Char Schnarr, were presented on April 18-20 by Trevecca's Department of Communication Studies. The Comedies included The School for Husbands and The Doctor in Spite of Himself, both of which were performed in the Tarter Student Activity Center.

The School For Husbands was a wonderful comedy done "in period" 18th century Paris. Sganarelle, played by Brian Niece, and his brother Ariste, played by Tim White, are the guardians of two young women, Isabelle and Leonor, played by Stacey Schnarr and Angel DellaCioppa respectively. Sganarelle, an ogre, rules Isabelle with an iron hand. Meanwhile, Ariste allows

Leonor many liberties. Valere, though in love with Isabelle, is unable to woo her because of the strict eye that Sganarelle keeps on her. Isabelle, tired of her guardian's stifling care, plans to marry Valere. She manages to send him proof of her love using Sganarelle. The two young lovers are married and Sganarelle learns that it is better to hold that which one loves loosely.

The Doctor in Spite of Himself is a marvelous classic that was brought to life in a southern light. Sganarelle is back, again played by Brian Niece. This time he is a Southerner of the redneck variety who is taken to be a great doctor. His wife Martine, played by Stacey Schnarr, plots to have him pay for all the beatings he has given her by making two servants of a rich man think that her husband is

a great doctor. She tells the men that Sganarelle will only admit that he is a doctor if he is beaten. The servants, Valere (Wes Craft) and Lucas (Tripp York), beat Sganarelle and bring him to their master, whose daughter Lucinde (Mary Ann Hoffman) is claiming to be mute in order to avoid an arranged marriage. Sganarelle learns by accident of this and arranges for the "cure." Lucinde, upon receiving her lover, regains her speech and tells her father (Jeff Frame), that she will not have any other.

The plays were a delight. The humor of the sight gags made them interesting for those that were unable to catch the verbal barbs. The use of costuming in the first play was wonderful. The visual effect was all in all quite impressive. The speeches

in the first play, however, were a bit too stiff. It seemed that one or two of the actors were unable to overcome the sing-song rhythm of the play's couplet form. Angel DellaCioppa and Tim White, on the other hand, demonstrated a great deal of skill and charm in their presentation of the lines. They shone as gems in the mist of chaos and one

found oneself wanting an encore.

The second play was more well-rounded. The director took a completely new approach to the play by placing it in the contemporary South. The use of accents and southern slang made the speeches highly entertaining. Overall, the acting was superb.

An Interview with Herman Weaver

Herman Weaver played professional football for 10 years with the Detroit Lions and Seattle Seahawks. Weaver visited the Trevecca campus on April 16 and 17 to share his testimony in chapel and to be the guest speaker at the T-Club Sixth Annual Fund Raising Dinner. The following interview was conducted on April 17.

Q: What message do you take to High Schools? Is it hard to speak in that type of situation? How do you feel you are received?

A: Mine is a message of hope, because I think that we live in a hopeless society. Kids think that there is no hope, and you can tell that by the way they react to things. Today it is so sad that kids are reacting to things temporally like most everyone and really [do not have] the eternal perspective that God has given us. I think that it has been left out of our schools. So to go in there with the good news—it's great with me. And really [I am] pretty well received in most of the schools. Ninty-nine percent of people are very much for [what I have to say]. . . . [I]n the long run I'm really thankful that I have a chance to share with someone else what the good Lord has done for me.

Q: What were the circumstances of your conversion?

A: It was my second year in the National Football League and I'd experienced a lot of drinking recently. All that I had had of life just made me miserable inside, and I just knew there had to be more. I [went to a team prayer meeting] just because I wanted to see if someone else had more, and really I'd been taught that it was what you did or you didn't do [that mattered]. Life was going to tip the scales one way or the other and I knew I couldn't make up for the bad that I had done. I was

really wondering if there was a better way when this guy shared Jesus with me. We had the Bible at home but I never really read it; I never really understood it the way I should have. I guess God just turned that light on, and said "I do love you even though you've made a lot of mistakes."

Q: How do you react to stress? Stress is often a problem for us college students.

A: Really stress in my life is probably so much different; I'm in spiritual warfare. When I come to a place like this, a Christian college, you know everybody's for you. There's no stress here, it's peaceful here. When I'm out in school situations there is a lot of stress. It is warfare going on because we know that we're in enemy territory. [I] see that [all the time] and really the only thing that can help is prayer. Prayer is the key.

Q: We are here in a university setting. What was your college experience like? What advice do you have for college students?

A: Well, if I were to have to go back to college, I would definitely go to a Christian college because I think it's a whole different world. . . . You don't have to be so and so, you don't have to prove anything to anyone because you all have something in common—you have Christ in common. To me, that's the most important thing you can have.

Q: Did you have some struggles being at the University of Tennessee?

A: Yes. Very much so. And if it hadn't been for my wife, it would have been a very, very tough time. The Good Lord put us together when I was a junior, and it just worked out she's been the greatest part of my life here on earth. My first priority in life is God and if I can please him, He'll take care of everything else. There's nothing like it. When you have God in control of

your life, it is amazing. I've seen miracle after miracle. He will take care of you because He comes to you.

Sports World Ministries, of which Weaver has been a full-time staff member since 1990, has reached over 7 million teenagers with the gospel of Jesus Christ in over 13,000 junior and senior high schools across the United States.

The TCAC named Head Coach Renae Kirkhart as Coach of the Year. TNU shortstop Brandy Barnett was selected for the TCAC all conference team.

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
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Music Review: Dino's Quiet Time

The title of this album is very appropriate, as I had to turn my CD player's volume way up just to hear this thing. I was a bit curious as to what sort of music would come out of my machine. Dino has definitely diversified over recent years. I had once thought of him as just playing virtuoso piano music, often at the speed of light (or maybe speed of sound—I'm not sure; physics is next year), but more recently he has had choral music, classical, "movie theme" music, and piano accompanied by sounds of nature. This album, "Quiet Time," is also a change from the past.

Quiet Time is a reflective inspirational album full of quiet hymn settings and variations designed to bring a "peaceful and quiet

interlude with our Lord." It is very pleasant background music with very familiar hymns such as, "It is Well," "Peace, Peace, Wonderful Peace," and "Great is thy Faithfulness." If it was not for the fact that it will not be released to stores until May 28, I would recommend for you to get it for your mothers for Mother's Day. It will be the first in a new series from Dino and comes with devotionals associated with each of the songs.

Don't expect flashy, technically difficult, impressive keyboard action from this disc. At times, these songs sound more like mellow and flowing George Winston improvisations. The majority of the songs are quite sedate, while a couple are diluted versions of the old Dino style. Though not flamboyant, Quiet Time has its own pleasant beauty.
