Dr. Jay Zajas, a professor of business and education at Trevecca, attended the Rutherford County American Summit on Education & Community Development held in Middle Tennessee. President Bill Clinton and General Colin Powell launched the National Summit earlier this year. Each state will conduct its own summit as a follow up to the national event. The three-day summit was held in mid-November with representatives from all areas of Tennessee.

Dr. Zajas was selected as one of two faculty members

from middle Tennessee to serve as a team facilitator for the conference. Over 300 attendees participated including Governor Don Sundquist,

state legislators John Hood and Mary Eckles, and numerous state directors, mayors, county and city executives, educational and business leaders.

TNU focuses on the family

On March 21 Trevecca is sponsoring a conference on building healthy families. The title of the seminar is Conference on the Family: Creating a new Balance. The Saturday conference will begin at 8:30 A.M. The conference offers two options: the family enrichment track—designed for parents, grandparents, and those interested in family life—and a professional track for counselors, educators, social workers, ministers, or anyone who works professionally with families.

Dr. David Elkind, a leading researcher in child development and social issues, will be one of the two featured speakers. He is the au-

thor of several books that address children's problems and has appeared on the *Today* show, *20/20*, *Oprah*, and other programs. The other featured speaker is H. Norman Wright, founder/director of Christian Marriage Enrichment. He is the author of 60 books (some are best sellers), and is a former faculty member at Talbot Theological Seminary and the Graduate School of Counseling at Biola University.

"I am proud of our featured speakers because they bring a wealth of knowledge and experience," said Jan Harvey, conference coordinator and placement director at TNU.

The conference will also include over two dozen workshops that will be conducted by profes-

sionals from different disciplines in addition to TNU faculty.

There are numerous scholarships being offered to students who work at the conference by hosting workshops, marketing, parking, etc. If they work at least 15 hours they can attend free—otherwise there is a \$25 student fee.

Other costs are as follows: Family Enrichment Track - \$30 (individuals), \$50 (couples) and Professional Track - \$45 (CEUs included). Families give millions

Trevecca recently received three very generous gifts from three philanthropic families, according to Jan Greathouse, director of public information.

The Gerald Quick and Gerald Skinner families each donated \$1 million. Gerald and Kay Quick designated their gift for the new library, and Gerald and Eileen Skinner designated their gifts for scholarships.

Don and Zelma Waggoner also gave Trevecca 25,000 shares of Cintas stock, valued at around \$1 million. This

gift is currently undesignated. The Waggoners are currently members of the Trevecca Million dollar circle, which recognizes sponsors who have donated gifts of \$1 million or more cumulatively. The gift, received January 31, 1997, makes the second million dollar donation from the family.

The donations of the Quick, Skinner, and Waggoner families along with donations from other families and churches have resulted in \$6.3 million in gifts and pledges towards the TNU Centennial Goal of \$25 million by the year 2001.

Trevecca considers Education doctorate

The Board of Trustees has approved a request to change Trevecca from a level III school to a level IV institution. The decision was made at the board's fall meeting, according to TNU President Millard Reed. This decision paves the way for Trevecca to be the first Nazarene school in the United States to offer a doctorate in education.

Having received a favorable recommendation by the state Board of Teacher Education, Trevecca's Division of Education is developing the program—a proposed Ed.D for education practitioners in the fields of education, business and



medicine.

At the January 16th faculty and administrators meeting, Melvin Welch, dean of the Division of Education, said the three-year program would meet on Saturdays during the fall and spring semesters and for an intense eight-day residential session each summer.

Pending final approval by the Board of Trustees the doctoral program may begin as early as the fall of 1998.

Eye on your aid: dangers of loan defaults

If you fall into the category of traditional student—i.e., a student coming to college immediately following high school—you most likely came to college with no debt or financial investments. If you are a non-traditional student—over 24 years of age—you may have incurred some debt and may have some type of financial investment for your future. Regardless of your status, once you are a student it is likely that you will borrow funds through the Federal Student Loan



Program. The Office of Financial Aid awards these loans, and students do not usually make payments while they are in school. Upon graduation, the average indebtedness for a traditional student is \$23,000.00, and, for non-traditional students, the amount is often higher due to the fact that funds are borrowed to help with living expenses.

Students sometimes

struggle with the fact that they must take out student loans to finance their education. They realize the day will soon come when monthly payments will begin. The question is often asked, "Is it worth borrowing student loans to finance my education?" I believe the answer to this is "Yes."

Student loans are both an investment and debt that will affect your future. The common sense rule that applies to borrowing is ABC. Always Borrow Conservatively. Trevecca has a very low default rate on student loans. The cur-

rent default rate is 7.3%. While we would like that rate to be lower, this figure means that 92.7% of our students are successfully managing their student loans. This is largely due to consolidation companies who help students develop a plan that is manageable for them.

Wise people have often said that anything worthwhile is bought at a great price. Your education is a high goal and worthy of your investment of time and finances. Keep in mind that this is your future and then decide if it is worth the investment.

We have had good ball movement, but we need some improvement in rebounding.”

Dan Munchmore and fellow senior Charles Wade serve as team captains. These two provide good leadership by helping the new players learn Coach Harris’ system. Dan told me that before the team added the new players, the team was out-manned. Dan believes the new players are learning what it takes to win the close game. He thinks that the rest of the games this season are going to be close. Brad Votaw, one of the new players, does a good job of accepting his role of doing the dirty work - playing hard and helping with rebounding.




As promised, here are the stories and facts about some of these couples. Listen up, guys, and take some hints from these couples!



Prison ministries: spreading Christ's love to the bound

For the past two years, Wes Furlong has felt a real need for a prison ministry at Trevecca. A prison ministry is one that has often been neglected in the past, but it is now one of the fastest-growing ministries in the country. Wes felt that a prison ministry would be a great addition to the other ministries on campus. Now, through much prayer and the added efforts of Rick Underwood, his mission to begin a prison ministry has become a reality.

"The greatest part of this ministry has been seeing it put hope into the prisoners' lives," said Wes. "It really means a lot to



them for us to come."

On the surface, a prison service seems very similar to any other service. There is a typical greeting, singing, usually a testimony, and a time of preaching. However, the prisoners' responses to the ministry are anything but ordinary. Many of them are longing for something more in their lives to

which only this kind of service can lead them. The best part of the ministry is after the service when everyone is able to speak individually with the prisoners for a time of personal evangelism. Wes even called this a bonding experience with them.

Wes commented that his goals for the ministry are to see it continue.

"I would like for there to be a revival in the prison," he said. "Our focus is to see their lives transformed. The strongest part of the ministry is not the services we hold, but the prisoners who go out and witness to other prisoners as a result of the services."

He added that many of the prisoners become preachers after being released. He also said that he wants to center on accountability this semester since it is often difficult to continue living a Christian life in prison.

According to Wes, the danger that can result is to see the prison ministry as nothing more than a se-

ries of programs. "The strength of the ministry is prayer," he noted. The prisoners should see this as a way that Christ can work in their lives. If people come wanting to just make the prisoners feel more comfortable with their lives, the ministry is falling short of its goal.

The prison services are held weekly on Monday nights. However, anyone interested in becoming part of the ministry must first go through an orientation session at the prison, which can be done anytime. For more information, contact Wes Furlong at extension 6850.

You don't have to call anyone at the health care center and ask them what you can do. You can make a difference by walking over there and talking to

some people for fifteen minutes. If you want to organize something big, then get a group of people together to go over there and sing a few hymns. Imagine how much you can brighten someone's day. You can let an old man tell you his war stories. You can write a letter for an older lady who does not see too well anymore. You can watch a basketball game on television with an eighteen year-old who will never dribble a basketball again because he was left paralyzed after a car accident. It is amazing how an Alzheimer's patient who cannot remember his own name can remember every word to the hymns he sang

in church as a child.




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Reel Talk review: Stallone's *Daylight*

CENTER STAGE (new release section) *Daylight* (1996) In this highly intense, surprisingly non-violent action film, Sylvester Stallone plays a retired rescue chief called back into service when the New Jersey tunnel collapses, trapping a dozen or so survivors between the crumbling ceiling and the rising water. Believe it or not, time is running out and the odds are against him. Will our hero be able to save the victims before the tunnel collapses? Will he get the girl? Will he go on to play an ill-costumed villain in the next mindless Batman sequel? Tune in next week to find out. Actually, though the film is predictable, it is not your run-of-the-mill, shoot-em-up movie, full of awkwardly contrived scenarios and timely one-liners. If you like action movies, this

one's pretty good, and you don't have to wade through the usual blood, guts, and profanity that tend to plague action films these days. If you have nightmares about being trapped in tight places with no sunlight, limited oxygen, and lots of hairy rodents, I don't recommend watching this film (or studying in the Mackey library for that matter). Remember Arachnophobia? Well, they were going to name this one Claustrophobia, but Stallone couldn't pronounce it without spitting. Rated PG-13. **FROM THE FLOOR** (movies you may have missed) *The War* (1994) The most worthwhile film Kevin Costner ever made. A beautiful story about a good man trying to make a better world. Set in the early 1970s in rural Mississippi, Costner plays a psychologically vulnerable Vietnam vet who tries to

teach his children about the true meanings of love, hope, and courage in a world of violence, poverty, and injustice. Elijah Wood plays a boy struggling to become a man, confused about his father's quiet strength and passive courage. Narrated by an observant, strong-spirited sister, the film is strongly reminiscent of Harper Lee's classic novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. A touching blend of humor, tragedy, adventure, and romance that ranks among the most moving pictures we've ever seen. Don't miss it. **SIGNIFICANT OTHERS** (movies for two) *Always* (1989) Academy Award winners Holly Hunter and Richard Dreyfuss star in a film vastly superior to its predecessor, *Ghost*. Directed by Steven Spielberg, with a score by our favorite composer, John Williams

(*Star Wars*, *ET*, *Jurassic Park*), and a special appearance by Audrey Hepburn. A firefighter pilot named Pete (Dreyfuss) goes down in a heroic rescue attempt and returns as the guardian angel of a young trainee. The conflict emerges when the trainee falls in love with Pete's girlfriend, Dorinda (Hunter), who can't let go of his memory. The ending is predictable, but heart-wrenching nonetheless. Dreyfuss is captivating. Hunter is irresistible. Together they're magic. Watch it with someone you love and don't be surprised if "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes." **THE SILVER SCENE** (oldies but goodies) *Casablanca* (1943) Of all the movies on all the shelves in all the world, this is one of the best. A classic story of love and loyalty set in French-occupied Morocco at the out-

set of W.W.II, and one of the most quoted works of the twentieth century, this film has captivated audiences for generations. Starring in this film are Humphrey Bogart and a breathtaking Ingrid Bergman. If it's been a while since you've seen it, "play it again."
