


Another year and we present another Oasis. A compilation of activities which serve to ever keep our gay college days alive in our memories.

Civilian Pilot Training At N. N. C.

"Flying is the hardest thing in the world to learn and the easiest to do."

About 45 students of N. N. C. primary Civilian Pilot Training Course have received their private pilot certificates upon the successful completion of this course since June, 1940. This means that they have flown from 40 to 50 hours, passed the flight test, attended about 72 hours of ground school, and passed four individual written tests: Navigation, Meteorology, Civil Air Regulations, and General Service of Aircraft.

The student's first great milestone in this course is his first solo flight after eight to ten hours of dual instruction. The next peak experience is his first solo spin. He starts to stall the "ship" for the spin; but no, "Maybe I'd better start over again." He starts again, and then hesitates, "Well, I got to do it, so . . ." A stall and then full right or left rudder, and he's in his first solo spin.

Several who have completed the primary course are taking advanced C. P. T. courses, or are in the Navy, or Army Air Corps. Other fields are open, such as instructing, Airlines, Control Tower operating, and engineering.


Academy Basketball







Academy Debate Squad


