VOTE FOR ASNNC OFFICERS MONDAY

Spring has sprung. With the beginning of third term comes the weather that we all love and the activities that make Nampa, Idaho bearable. However, along with the weather and activities comes the NNC ritual of elections.

Campaign signs are everywhere. They are on walls, trash cans, and bathroom stalls. The hours of work put into signs is done with the hopes of swaying the vote one way or

another.

If you feel as if you are drowning in election propoganda, hang on, there are still three weeks left.

Voting for ASNNC executive officers begins on Monday, and sign-ups for the appointed positions of ASNNC business manager, religious life director, and community relations coordinator are now posted on the president's window.

Tuesday, April 9, is the last day to sign up for a publication editor position. The sign-up sheets are posted on the vice-president's window.

Filing for class officers and senators begins on Friday, April 12. Elections for class officers will begin on April 29, and runoffs will be continued as necessary.

The reason for the early election date is to enable the ASNNC officers to attend the Nazarene Student Leadership Conference to be held at Point Loma Nazarene College on April 17. At the conference the officers will attend seminars on leadership and also have the chance to discuss ideas and strategies with other people who hold the same position at other Nazarene Colleges.

When only eight students attended last term's all-school forum, student involvement at NNC appeared despairingly low.

As third term begins, however, twelve candidates are running for ASNNC executive offices, and eight students have signed up for appointed offices, reflecting a high level of student participation.

ASNNC Community Relations Coordinator Tina McKenzie reported that "many students are getting involved" in activities and ASNNC Social Vice-President

Ben Thomas commented that attendance at social activities has increased this year.

After the ASNNC Senate mailed a resolution regarding the Persian Gulf crisis to the White House, about 75 students showed up January 22 to express their dissatisfaction.


Still, many issues remain unaddressed. Student government leaders, although concerned with such issues as campus housing, the quarters-to-semester switch, the disciplinary system, and campus security, are unable to initiate many changes without widespread student support.

The ASNNC President can talk for hours with Dr.

Hills, and the Senate can draft scores of resolutions, but until students actively express their views, these actions carry little weight.

Find a way to get involved. Take advantage of the many opportunities provided for students to express their opinions. Set an appointment with an administrator or a faculty member. Present your concerns to your senators.

By all means, keep participating in student activities and attending social events, but don't let your involvement stop there. Student opinions shape the character of this institution. NNC exists for the students; let your voice be heard.



We, as students, need to put the school back on track and put the administration back where they belong...behind our desks!


Hello, my name is Don Curtis, and I want to be your ASNNC President. Thank you.


ELECT STEVE EMERSON:


